Where can large campervans park in town centres?

Large campervans are prohibited from parking in Queenstown's town centre but 33 parking spaces are available specifically for campervans in the Boundary Street Carpark nearby.

Five spaces are available at the Mt Aspiring Road Carpark in Wānaka with plenty more in the parking lot near That Wanaka Tree and the Wānaka Watersports Facility.

Eight spaces are available at the Ramshaw Lane Carpark in Arrowtown.

Waste not, want not

Our community shares the responsibility of being guardians of this stunning landscape. We hope that you will make the most of our wild playground, and care for it as we do by leaving no trace. Help us eliminate waste in the Queenstown Lakes District by supporting some of these local options while you're here:

DRINK TAP WATER

Drink our tap water - it's free, healthy and delicious, and will help reduce single use plastic waste. The RefillINZ website map or app makes it easy to find locations where you can refill your reusable water bottle for free.



SAY NO TO SINGLE USE TAKE-AWAY CUPS

Say no to single use take-away cups - sit in, bring your own reusable cup or use a deposit/return system in participating cafes. Local loan cup examples include Wanakup and Chunky.



COMPOST YOUR FOOD SCRAPS

Some campgrounds have separate food scrap bins available, or you can drop by a local composter using the Sharewaste platform. Sharewaste connects people who wish to recycle their food scraps and other organics with their neighbours who are already composting, worm-farming, or keep farm animals.



RECYCLE WITH CARE

Put only the right things in recycling bins so it can meet quality standards. Recycling is available at campgrounds, the Wakatipu Recycling Centre in Queenstown and at Wastebusters in Wānaka (a small fee applies). Please note: private resident and public litter bins are not to be used by campers for the disposal of general waste.

Is my vehicle certified self- contained?

A self-contained vehicle must meet the Caravan Self Containment Certification standard. You'll need to be able to live in it for three days without getting more water or dumping waste. Your vehicle must have:



A toilet



Fresh water storage



Wastewater storage



A rubbish bin with a lid



A self-containment certificate warrant card must be displayed at all times

How to be a responsible camper



Ensure your vehicle is certified self-contained



Always use the provided toilets (or your own)



Use a designated wastewater dump station for your sewage sink water



Use your own facilities for showering and toileting to keep our environment clean and pollution free



Dispose of your rubbish at transfer stations in Frankton and Wānaka and recycle mixed plastics and glass with care.



Always park in the areas specifically designated for your type of vehicles
