

Annual Plan Submission - Community Grant Application

This is in support of a request for increased funding for annual operating expenses and additional/replacement of essential equipment and software to meet the increasing needs of the community. This communication provides more information than on the On-line Submission Form.

The Upper Clutha Historical Records Society is a registered Charity, incorporated in 2010 but operating since 1985.

The objectives of the Society are:

- 1. To collect and preserve historical records in the Upper Clutha District,
- 2. That it uses its powers to advise concerning historic aspects of the district,
- 3. The preservation of, and the education in, all aspects of historic research.

The Society has approximately 50 financial members, mainly older residents of Wānaka and outlying areas. The work of collecting and cataloguing records and photographs of the district, answering queries etc, is undertaken by about 10 members who are all volunteers and receive no personal remuneration for their work.

Over time, the Society has amassed a considerable amount of material including farm records, family histories, letters, firms' account books, minutes of organisations, school records, maps and photographs. These form an invaluable and irreplaceable record of the district's history. Additions to these records occur very regularly.

The Council has recognised the Society as the appropriate body for this function in the Upper Clutha area and when the new Wānaka Library was built, the Council, appreciating the value of the collection and the importance of the work of the Society, and with the financial assistance of Central Lakes Trust, provided a dedicated firerated and secure room in the new library for the use of the Society and storage of its records. These records are available to members of the public on request. There is considerable demand from the public for access to the records, often when there is commemoration of events such as centennials, or by people tracing their history. It is important that these local records remain local where they are accessible to this community. We are also called upon by QLDC and other local institutions e.g Lake Wānaka Tourism, Heart of Wānaka, QLDC re Upper Clutha War Memorials, to provide input and check information on a regular basis.

For example, about 200 hours was spent checking the Millenium Tiles for QLDC, 15 hours on the Heart of Wānaka Project, and well over 60 hours of the Lake Wānaka Tourism history project. We have assisted the Wanaka Library with displays of items e.g. TV Photo display and enjoy excellent support from the Librarians which is reciprocated. We have enjoyed support (non-monetary) from Ngai Tahu and local contacts in preserving and making available to the public, matters of Māori history.

Currently we are working on a major project to record the oral histories of local residents and digitising recordings discovered in a variety of locations, mainly of folk who are no longer alive. This project has involved the purchase of specialised recording equipment and training of 12 interviewers by Dept of Internal Affairs and National Oral History Assn of NZ staff. The Society has also been liaising and working closely with the with the Central Otago Oral History Project which is based in Alexandra. This is an ongoing project that will stretch our financial resources beyond the next 12 months.

The project is being co-ordinated with the Central Otago Oral History Project. Financial support has come forth from the likes of Otago Community Trust and Central Lakes Trust for some of the expenses, the balance mainly being funded from our own resources. It is intended that these recordings will become available to the public.

The Society is also looking to the future by recording current events and changes to the district that are our future history e.g. new Luggate Memorial Hall and photographing existing business buildings in Wanaka CBD.

The Society operates a database called "PastPerfect". It is used by many museums throughout NZ, including Lakes County Museum. Work continues apace in recording the details of all records, images, oral recordings, historical maps etc into this database. The written records have now all been indexed onto the database, and work is proceeding on entering photos and maps. Members of the Society have regular working sessions at the Records Room at the library, both working on the older records and on entering new material as it comes to hand. Many hours of voluntary effort goes into this. On average, about 2,000 recorded hours, per annum, are spent by volunteers on Society activities.

Over the past three years the Society has purchased and developed a computer network allowing for remote access by researchers and others. All the historical maps have been professionally scanned and work goes on in scanning the extensive paperbased records held. This activity provides a backup to the records should fire or other damage occur at some time in the future. It is also a step towards being able to grant the public remote access to a large portion of our records.

Past Grants:

The Society has received a grants of \$2000 in 2021-22 and 2022-2023 direct from the Wānaka Library to assist with operating expenses.

Grant Requested 2023-2024

The Committee seeks a grant of \$10,000 (inclusive of the Wānaka Library grant)

The funding of the Society's work is becoming increasingly difficult. For example, IT and Web expenses have doubled to \$2800 which is over 100% over last year's expense. Our income is principally (aside from any specific one-off project grants):

- Membership Fees and members donations. As most members are retired folk, there are limits to any increases.
- Public donations
- Sale of our publications and photo images
- Grants (including \$2000 from QLDC via the Wanaka Library for the past 2 years).

To move forward and maintain the services to the public and community bodies in the area covered by QLDC, the Society needs to:

- Upgrade PastPerfect database to allow public access (PastPerfect currently charges an annual fee of circa \$1800 for this facility).
- Replace the existing two computer screens at the Library (currently we use two ex QLDC screens kindly donated some 4+ years ago)
- Continue to fund the 'operational working expenses' of the Oral History Project (a project new to the Society)
- Provide voluntary support and resources to the QLDC Cemeteries and Heritage Team in it's review of the Cemeteries Bylaw 2017.
- Find increased funding to meet normal running expenses.

The Society, with its small and elderly membership, has very limited access to funds to deal with the ongoing operating costs of maintaining and protecting the record collection and adding to it as new items are made available, and dealing with enquiries. If the collection is to be maintained and continue to be accessible to the Wānaka and wider communities, some additional funding in addition to membership income is needed to support the substantial voluntary input of members.

The resources/records held by the Society are a valuable facility to the community at large.

It is possible that in the longer term, the collection may be incorporated into the Wānaka Library if the Society found itself unable to give the collection the care it needs. It is important that the collection and its cataloguing be not allowed to fall into a state of neglect.

It is therefore requested that the Council consider providing an increased grant to the Society to assist in its ongoing work: to help fund materials, operating costs and to assist with the cost of the needed equipment upgrades. Such grants have been received from time to time in the past.

It is considered by the Committee that an annual grant of \$10000 would be appropriate and it is requested that such a sum be included in the Annual Plan.

Happiness House is a one of a kind in Queenstown but also in the entire New Zealand, we are a bit like the Ferg Burger of the community support centers. We are the only drop in facility in Queenstown. We are available as a community resource, everyone is welcome to enjoy a tea or coffee and a chat, participate in the free activities, like gardening club, knitting group, wellbeing walks, Tai Chi, etc. We have a small resource room, where people can find affordable clothing and free clothing for children under 3 years old. We also now have free counselling sessions for anyone in the community who is struggling with stress, anxiety, mental health in general.

Happiness House has been part of the Whakatipu Scene for a number of decades. It continues to have a growing following with community support and is always adapting to new circumstances.

I am a small business (commercial user) at the Wanaka Recreation Centre. I am writing to oppose the significant lane hire increase the council is suggesting within the draft plan. The financial impact on me being able to run a financially viable group, and keep this affordable for community members is significantly impacted by this decision. Firstly, a one off increase of 74% is a significant increase for any business to bear, let alone a small business. I am a one man band, and you are asking me to find approximately \$8000 extra to provide a service to the community. This effectively is an extra \$1.85 / swim extra for a community member to join a successful, positive group. I bring in up to 90 paying visits to the pool each week and pay pool hire (both bringing a significant income to the pool), and inspire a huge amount of adults to stay active and keep fit. Because I am not a community group, or standard user I am to face a 7 fold increase in my fees compare to a community group, or a 43% extra rise compared to a standard user. Yet, I provide a very similar service to both groups, and contribute more financially already than both other groups Further to this, the Council swimming school has no charges for lane hire, and also swimmers do not pay an entry fee on top of their class fees. This creates an even further significant gap in the fairness of applied fees by the recreation centres. I am not opposed to a fees rise, capped at \$15. But I strongly oppose the significant increase the council has proposed.

Uruuruwhenua Health inc. was established in 2006 in the Central Otago region to help Whanau access health and support services, with support from Ngai Tahu, and local kaumatua. Originally focusing on health issues for Whanau in our community, the organisation soon realised that the social service support was also needed, so the organisation expanded into social services mahi. In 2017 Uruuruwhenua took Whanau ora Navigation to Queenstown/Wanaka where we had a fulltime Navigator supporting the community until 2021. 2021-2022 we were unable to fill the role of Navigator for Queenstown/Wanaka and find a suitable mahi space. 2022/2023, Uruuruwhenua sourced a suitable/affordable location, and recruited 2 Navigators to cover the area. Uruuruwhenua Health inc covers Central lakes area, although mainly based in Central Otago. We have offices in Alexandra, Cromwell, and Queenstown. We share an office space in Ranfurly and Wanaka. Our main hub is in Alexandra. We work with Partner agencies from the wider Otago and Southland Rohe. We have opened an office in Frankton in January 2023 to better support the community. We are currently developing our Queenstown and Wanaka services in the hope to expand to cover more areas of need. We have 3 staff in Queenstown, 2 Whanau Ora Navigators including 1 Rangatahi Māori who is working in a kaiawhina role/apprenticeship, and a Tahuna site manager. Our Tahuna team also cover Wanaka and surrounds. We have 2 other contracts that are based in Alexandra but also cover the Queenstown lakes area. (FVIARS and Kaiarahi) We are wanting to run workshops and wananga in Queenstown for Whanau so will utilize our tari for this mahi also. Services are delivered face to face with Whanau, either in their homes, or in our office. Many programs we run are wananga based, so everyone comes together to learn.

The Community Centre is extensively used by our community on a daily basis. It is operated by local volunteers but the continual increase in insurance cost makes it very difficult for the committee to focus on improving the facilities when revenue is consumed by heating, compliance and insurance costs. The increase in the cost of insurance also has a direct link to the overall cost of building. 10 years ago the Community Centre extension cost \$1.5M to build, today the replacement cost is \$7.8M. So even when the cost of insurance does not increase, the cost to replace the building does and this has a direct effect on the cost of insurance. The Community Centre must give up other plans like having a generator installed for use in a natural disaster because the insurance costs are never known from year to year and the maintenance costs of a generator, while fixed, may not be affordable if the cost of insurance continues to climb the way it has in the past 10 years. The Community Centre has no choice but to pay but no other commitments can be undertaken because of this.

From discussion with stakeholders I find that the increase to commercial lane hire for the Wānaka recreation centre to be unreasonable. The main cause for this is the apparent lack of consultation with those stakeholders i.e. swim coaches. These stakeholders are often small/independent business owners and an increase of almost 75% could place a significant strain on their capacity to provide valuable services to members of the community. Small business owners are also having to deal with cost of living increases, including mortgages, and the substantial increase of lane costs has the potential, over the course of 12 months, to be in the thousands of dollars. Of course, these costs could be spread across the users, which is reasonable. However, the users are already having to pay entry fees to the pool. I accept that fees for the pool are not increasing, but the point still stands that the council is benefitting from both fees and lane hire from the same group. These small business are bringing in a large numbers of fee paying customers into the aquatic centre and it seems disingenuous that they would not be consulted when the clearly provide a not insubstantial revenue source for the pool. Particularly considering that the rates for community and standard use has not increased by much in comparison. I accept that a commercial user should be expected to pay more, but they are also people who are having to make their own ends meet in this time of increased cost of living. Again, the issue is not so much the financial aspect, but the fact that important stakeholders have not been consulted or provided an opportunity to provide views on these fee increases, ensuring that the increases are reasonable and spread in a way that makes sense across the types of user. I am very concerned that the contractual arrangements for major infrastructure work mean that the costs are simply spiralling with the majority of the risk falling to ratepayers.

The proposed rates increases are unacceptable and unaffordable and a revised budget needs to be prepared urgently that provides a clear breakdown of opex by cost centre to enable councillors to review all planned expenditure. Staff need to transparently identify what are the 'must do' activities and identify where savings can be made and the CE needs to be held accountable for delivering this. Work to progress Project Connect and Manawa is simply unaffordable at this time. It is very clear that the district is unable to cope with the current population and visitor numbers. This is manifesting itself in a number of ways that we are all too familiar with. A pause in anything that is going to enable growth has to be made firstly to reduce QLDC spending but importantly to allow a period of catch up and stability not only for the wellbeing of those here now but also to reduce the spiralling costs incurred by council as they work to enable growth. As part of this, Council needs to direct its CCTO, Queenstown Airport Corporation, that plans to build a new terminal and double visitor numbers must be put on hold. In addition to the impacts on the community of rapid growth, we cannot afford the impact that the proposed expenditure will have on the short/medium term dividend at a time when QLDC will be desperately short of funds. The best way to increase dividend profitability is to maximise the current infrastructure whilst severely limiting capital expenditure at the airport.

If these increases have been implemented because there's a specific revenue target you need to hit for swim bookings, it would make a lot more sense to reverse engineer these increases: How many bookings per year from Community channel? How many bookings per year from Standard channel? How many bookings per year from Community channel? If you know the above and you know the revenue target, it's a straightforward calculation to spread the increase across all three channels so that the percentage increase is equal. Doing it any other way actually seems unfair.





Louise loves being around cats and she thinks the things they do are really funny such as climbing, jumping, running around and playing. Louise also really loves to help and feel responsible. What she gets out of QT community cats is just incredible and 10 fold of what she gives in her time and effort.



The financial stress on families is likely to rapidly escalate and we will see cats being abandoned as families focus on surviving on the meagre resources they have. Abandoned cats and kittens will mean the feral cat population will explode, creating havoc with birdlife and other small animals. On the positive side, keeping cats with their owners offers therapeutic support to families, especially children. Cats help connect children to animals, develop their nurturing and provide companionship.

This project offers a way to help keep cats with their owners through these times. It is a practical solution that can be put in place to support people now. An investment now will pay dividends for the community, the environment and the cats.

I recommend this programme as a way to meet a number of needs and am happy to support it.

This in itself is testament to your passion, determination, drive, and ability to make things happen according to your purpose.

That you have formed your charity, having foreseen the difficulties and hardships that individuals/families may face during these unprecedented times, and the potential impact to the beloved family cat, is particularly relevant at this time.

The importance of The Cat to its human family is well documented, so we will not comment further, suffice to say the stress and sadness felt when these relationships are broken, for whatever reason, is very real.

I strongly oppose the proposed 13.6% rates increase and have the following points I would like to make:

- How much of this increase is to pay for the rapidly increasing QLDC staff numbers which I note are now advertised as over 600. That is a ridiculous amount of staff, especially considering they were slimmed down to less than 250 in 2013 and things operated fine. I appreciate town and aspects of the community have grown since then but not to that extent, and many of the roles I see advertised are clearly Nice to Have roles, no doubt with a well-paid salary to attract people. Does anyone actually question the new roles and whether they are needed or do they simply get signed off when someone says they are too busy and put a job justification together? I assume some extra staff have been employed to deal with the previous higher volumes of building consents etc, however will any staff be let go now that those consent numbers are dropping given people can no longer afford to build like they were previously?
- On a separate but similar note, there appears to be a larger team of in house lawyers now (I'd say at least six from the many job advertisements I've seen) why this is necessary I'm not sure, and I'd be interested to see if QLDC still use external lawyers which I imagine they do.
- Given such a large number of QLDC now appear to work from home, surely the idea of Project Manawa and the one office idea can be put to bed and money saved from that? What is the point of an office to house all the staff when the justification is no longer there? QLDC wanted to stay in town to stop town turning into a Disney World however unfortunately that has already happened and no locals come to town anyway due to no parking and the fact so many shops have moved out to Frankton. If QLDC does want one office I strongly now believe that should be away from the town centre i.e Frankton and not on such valuable land.
- Increased interest rates is being blamed for some of the increase. What will happen when the rates drop again in a year or two as economists are predicting I assume there would never be a reduction in rates in the future in line with interest rates which is unfair?
- 4% of the increase is being put down to paying for leaky buildings, that still leaves an over 9% increase which would be the biggest increase I've ever seen to my rates bill, let alone a 13.6% increase. Spending is clearly getting out of control at QLDC and the rate payer is expected to pick it up. Vanity projects such as the mooted sealing of the Frankton track shouldn't even be considered at present. I don't know anyone that has had a 13.6% pay increase so such a high increase is going to hit the rate payer and their pocket hard. People are already struggling at the moment and this is just going to hit them even more.

In summary, I am worried that no one round the council table is questioning the spending of QLDC which then falls on the ratepayer to pick it up. People may say that Mayor van Uden was too tight but at least she looked after the ratepayer and questioned spending and staff costs, something I strongly believe needs to be done again by yourselves as at present both are out of control.

Re Request for addition to Roading Capital Budget - Annual Plan

On behalf of the members of the Hedditch Street Apartments Body Corporate, I present this submission with regard to the urgent need for curbing, channelling, drainage and driveway entrances along Hedditch Street. We implore the council to investigate and allocate appropriate funds to remedy this situation, as soon as possible, before further damage and injuries occur.

Background

There are no curbing, channelling, drainage or driveway entrances along Hedditch Street. Our area of the street is below the level of the roadway and it is therefore particularly trying when wet and also dangerous for walkers. We have waited patiently, assuming that after the formation of the footpath along the lower side of Hedditch Street the project would be completed with curbing and drainage, etc installed. However, we now understand that no capital expenditure budget has been allocated to this work.

Hedditch Street runs parallel to Wanaka's main road, is very close to the CBD and used by large volumes of cyclists, motorists and pedestrians.

Issues

- Hedditch Street is now a very busy thoroughfare as for instance, parents ferry children to and from school and myriad tradespeople in trucks and 4-wheel drive vehicles travel around the back of the CBD. When it is or has been raining, this traffic assists to move surface water off the road and down our driveways. Even without traffic steady water runs through our properties from the road. There is also a constant flow of cyclists and walkers. It has been observed that many drivers entering Wanaka from the South turn right into Hedditch Street to avoid travelling through the CBD traffic.
- 2. Without a curb there are no driving and parking guidelines. For walkers, it is not a safe area to walk. People park on the path regularly.
- 3. The level of Hedditch street slopes sharply East to West. Our 10 apartments are on the lower West side of the road and suffer run off from the many and, these days more severe, rain events. Water and gravel from the roadside wash across the footpath and then down our driveways.
- 4. Owners of the units on the closest to the footpath report having to regularly clear gravel from storm drains and sweep gravel from the pathway and driveway. This to avoid gravel causing people to slip on the path and to keep storm water draining.
- 5. We have had movement underground in our long access driveway off Hedditch Street. Pipes have been burst under the bitumen as backfill around our pipes has moved. We are quite sure this is due to the constant water flow off the roadway.

Summary

Curbing is essential, firstly, it enables the separation of road and roadside, both for walkers and drivers. For drivers, this serves as a driving and parking guideline. For walkers, it serves as a safe area to walk.

Curbs help to keep vehicles off the footpaths where they could injure a pedestrian.

Curbs, if they are high enough, help to keep the water off the footpaths so that it is safer for pedestrians.

This work is urgent as the waterflow is affecting our underground infrastructure.

Curbs help to control water runoff and gravel movement and, in conjunction with the crown in the roadway, direct rainwater to the side of the street where it will not impede traffic.

If they are high enough, they do, in fact help keep traffic in the streets and away from pedestrians.

The road is very busy nowadays. Besides the negative effects of the water cascading through our properties, it is also looking aesthetically very shabby and unfinished and no complement to the lovely new waterfront developments.

We write in support of the central tenets of the Annual Plan and write to signal that the Glenorchy/Head of the Lake area has become a candidate for International Dark Skies Sanctuary status from the International Dark Skies Association.

We request:

- 1. QLDC formally support the Glenorchy Dark Skies Sanctuary application in principle and supply a letter of support for our application
- 2. Any review of the District Lighting Plan and Spatial plans include the Glenorchy Dark Skies Sanctuary group as part of its consultation process
- 3. Appropriate QLDC staff work collaboratively with us as a partner to help us develop our Dark Skies Sanctuary application to the International Dark Skies Association.
- 4. One-time funding assistance of up to \$20,000 from the Annual Plan to aid in the formal process of the creation and submission of our Dark Skies Sanctuary Bid in 2023.

The Glenorchy Dark Skies Sanctuary group was formed in 2020 beneath the umbrella of the Glenorchy Heritage and Museum Group, which has existed since 1997. The GHMG's mission is to preserve, celebrate and share the heritage of the Head of the Lake (Glenorchy and environs). The Dark Skies Sanctuary Group focuses specifically on the enduring powers of our access to a clear and unobstructed night skies as a unifier of our shared sense of place and as an intergenerational imperative linking us to past – present – and future. There are few things that are as grounding for well-being as looking up at the night sky and experiencing that remarkable sense of wonder the stars and planets allow.

Our mission aligns with the Vision Beyond 2050 goals most especially in the areas of **Thriving** people| Whakapuāwai Hapori; Embracing the Māori world| Whakatinana i te ao Māori; Pride in

sharing our places | Kia noho tahi tātou kātoa; and Breathtaking creativity | Whakaohooho Auahataka which strongly references our need to preserve our community heritage. We see further alignment with our work with the tenets of **Regnerative Tourism** which are being supported in the **Destination Management Plan** and we believe that a Dark Skies Sanctuary at Glenorchy will serve as an economic driver in bringing Dark Skies astrotourists to Glenorchy who will spend the night in Glenorchy, as opposed to the current model of largely day visitors.

An IDA Dark Sky Sanctuary is public or private land that has an exceptional or distinguished quality of starry nights and a nocturnal environment that is protected for its scientific, natural, or educational value, its cultural heritage and/or public enjoyment.

A sanctuary differs from a Dark Sky Park or Reserve in that it is typically situated in a very remote location with few (if any) nearby threats to the quality of its dark night skies and it does not otherwise meet the requirements for designation as a park or reserve. The typical geographic isolation of Dark Sky Sanctuaries significantly limits opportunities for public outreach, so a sanctuary designation is specifically designed to increase awareness of these fragile sites and promote their long-term conservation.

1.397,160 0 3.5 7 14 mi 0 5 10 20 km Earthatar Geographics Currently two sites exist in New Zealand: Great Barrier Island and Rakiura/Stewart Island (of only 17 designated Sanctuaries in the world). In February of 2023, we received permission from the IDA to become a candidate site for the first inland Sanctuary and may now proceed in developing a formal application. The Head of the Lake is an ideal location for a third sanctuary within New Zealand, especially as much of the area is situated in an internationally recognised UNESCO World Heritage Site. DSS status creates outstanding opportunities for Regenerative 'slow tourism' and for new industries focused on photography, dark sky tours, and relationship with heritage connections involving both Kai Tahu and settler cosmologies and histories.

The application process is long and rigorous and in this we ask for the support of QLDC as we pursue this on behalf of preserving the heritage of our night skies for generations to come. We have costed the whole of the application process and supporting activities

(website, legal, writing) to be \$35,000. We have raised \$15,000 already from the Glenorchy

community and now ask QLDC to support us with an amount up to \$20,000 towards our final goal. This is a one-time ask as we hope to submit our application by the end of 2023.

In the last year we have engaged in the following activities:

- A highly successful first Matariki event last winter supported by Te Hau Toka, GY Rural Women, with talks by Cory Ratahi, Professor Brian Boyle, and a performance by Ngā Manu Hou. Over 80 people attended and all left with a plant from the Glenorchy Native Plant nursery to further connect the conservation work at the Head of the Lake with the symbolism of Matariki.
- We hosted an astrotourism hui in August where over 25 people from Glenorchy and astrophotographers from Queenstown came to discuss benefits and synergies for the community and local businesses.
- We held provisional meetings with QLDC Lighting Team DOC to discuss alignment with the lighting strategy and to share the IDA lighting requirements with them.
- We engaged in informational outreach with all 7 of our region's rūnanga.
- We engaged in outreach with local landowners and now have verbal support from all local farm/station owners who will fall into the Sanctuary area.
- We received a statement of support from the Glenorchy Community Association and former Mayor Jim Boult on behalf of the previous council.
- We hosted a dinner for NZ's IDA representative Kyra Xavier.
- We engaged in an astrophotography/astrotourism reconnaissance trip to Invincible Hut supported by Rees Valley Station.
- We received a grant from the Otago Participatory Science Fund for 6 dark sky monitors which we will be using to support DOC hut rangers in the upcoming season who will take measurements for us and will do educational outreach for hut visitors during the summer season.
- We received support from Te Hau Toka to engage in a Dark Skies exchange trip where we will visit Naseby to see their Dark Sky Town project in June 2024.
- And most importantly, after much hard work, we were formally welcomed as a Dark Sky Sanctuary candidate from the IDA which now allows us to be a formal candidate.

As we move forward in our process, we will work closely with QLDC and appreciate the collaborative approach of the QLDC lighting team and their assistance in helping us to meet IDA standards. We are aware that the Spatial Plan does not include proposed growth for the

Glenorchy area beyond the original district plan, a vision that we fully support. Further, we ask that the District Lighting Plan take into consideration our plans and ensure that we are invited into any and all consultation about lighting in Glenorchy Township and at the Head of the Lake as this may impact our application.

Nocturnal darkness greatly affects wildlife and its biorhythms. Therefore, we also ask that in the Climate and Biodiversity Plan QLDC includes an action for Biodiversity protection and monitoring that take into account nocturnal species (most especially long-tailed bats which are a key species in Glenorchy). We will be working with the Routeburn Dart Wildlife Trust and the Southern Lakes Sanctuary to engage in greater nocturnal biodiversity monitoring and protection. We would be happy to help to advise in this area of biodiversity and its relationship with dark skies, and will work with QLDC and other members of the Winterstellar Trust to develop appropriate responses to suit our native wildlife.

The Glenorchy Dark Skies Sanctuary Group is a member of Winterstellar, a wider trust whose role is to provide support to all of the Dark Skies initiatives in the hope of ultimately creating an Otago-wide Dark Skies Sanctuary. We applaud Winterstellar's approach to landscape scale collaboration and are grateful for the support of its members who stretch from Dunedin and Moeraki, across Central, to Upper Clutha, Cardrona, and Glenorchy and also include members of the IDA and NZ Royal Astronomical Society. When approached by Winterstellar, we hope that QLDC will recognise the collective of which we are a very active member and consider our voice as one in its harmony.

We welcome you all to our second annual midwinter dinner celebrating Matariki on 15 July, a coorganised event with the Glenorchy Rural Women and look forward to sharing our clear night skies with you all, both now and in the future.

We have approximately 60 plots or allotments on council land on Gorge Rd that allow some 100 households and families to grow organic produce. The Gardens have been operating since 2009 and have become a valuable source of food for many people in need and also for families who live in shared housing or apartments with no access to a garden. We are a tightknit community that helps support each other and also other charities such as Abbeyfield Wakatipu, Baskets of Blessing, Happiness House & amp; the Salvation Army by donating produce for food parcels and food preparation for those in need.

In 2022/23 we received \$5000 for operating costs. Funds were used for tank, fence & amp; tool maintenance. It was also used to hire equipment to level out unused areas of the garden to create more plots and to pay mow common areas.

Q29. What community projects or operational services will these funds be used to deliver?

This will be used principally to tackle our issue of lack of water supply , possibly install a new water tank and also guttering and downpipes off the shed roof to provide some rain catchment into the tanks. - we currently only have one tank which ran dry for over 2 months over summer. The existing tank is fed purely from a creek running off a nearby hillside which is on private land across the road. If we had some roof catchment off the shed into the tanks as well this would be immensely helpful. We would also like to strategically position a few IBC water tanks around the gardens that we can fill while there is plenty of water and use when the tank/s run dry. The funding would also be used to continue to maintain the fenceline keeping the perimeter predator free as well as upkeep of the electric fence and also for the hire, and or purchase of machinery such as mowers, small diggers and weedeaters to keep the common areas neat, tidy, firesafe and weed free. We also need a security camera as we have had thefts of produce and tools from the shed, as well as petrol siphoned out of the mower. We recently installed a solar powered motion sensor light and we have decoy cameras up on a pole but only as a deterrent because they do not work - no wifii and no power at the gardens. We would also like to build a small shade house next to the tunnel house we are completing - where we can harden off our seedlings that we hope to propagate in the tunnel house to give away to our members and the general public. Another request from some of our more senior and not so mobile members is for some bench seats around the gardens - some good solid outdoor seating that can be enjoyed by all.

Q30. How will this investment in your project or organisation be of value to the wider community?

We saw this year the massive difference the 5K grant received from QLDC made to the overall appearance and maintenance of the gardens which in turn had a knock on effect leading to members feeling more pride in their gardens and making more of an effort to keep their own plots in better condition. Investment in the maintenance of our gardens will be of value to the wider community by : 1.helping us to manage the communal plots for growing food for other community groups - Baskets of Blessings, Salvation Army, Happiness House, Abbeyfield Wakatipu. 2. By increasing general access to fresh foods and improving food security, our members share their produce with many others. 3. Increasing community knowledge of how to grow your own food thereby creating food resilience, educating our young and those new to NZ 4.Increasing physical activity through gardening 5.Improving dietary habits through education and access to organic produce 6.Reducing the risk of obesity and obesity-related diseases by all of the above 7.Improving our mental health through access to gardening and social interaction with other gardeners 8. Creating opportunities, social physical and educational through social cohesion When we ran out of water this year it became very difficult to keep our gardens growing productively and many members lost seedlings and some crops due to lack of water. Access to other water options would greatly assist us to strive towards and achieve the 8 objectives listed above.

We have applied for a Skycity Grant to build a community pantry at our gates with which we can fill with excess produce and specifically grown produce & amp; propagated seedlings to give away for free or a small donation. We hope to receive enough funding to pay for good signage and create a QR code that people can scan to make a donation or pay what they feel the produce and /or seedlings are worth. We have also applied for a Rotary grant to retrospectively cover the cost of a second hand ride on mower that one of our long term members purchased himself to mow the common areas. He has since fallen on hard times and we would like to buy it off him. He spends 3-5 hrs weekly mowing for which we pay him a minimal amount from our operational fund and member subs. Rotary have generously donated us \$1000 towards this mower. We need to raise another \$3000 to cover the cost of it .

The Whakatipu Wildlife Trust works with community environmental groups to support, connect and foster predator control efforts. We represent a unified voice for wildlife in the Whakatipu Basin; working towards a predator free Whakatipu. Our vision is to create and maintain a predator free environment throughout the greater Lake Whakatipu area to enable our birds and other native wildlife to flourish. We coordinate the efforts of over 70 trapping groups who are engaged in activities to help make the Queenstown Lakes District predator-free. It is our vision to encourage growth, to support the efforts of new groups and to help to educate the wider community on how we can all play a part in helping our native wildlife to flourish. Local communities and volunteer groups have taken up the responsibility to care for the future and ensure that there will still be wildlife and an outstanding natural habitat for future generations. Through this convergence of active local community groups, local government, and DOC, the Whakatipu Wildlife Trust was born. The WWT serves as both a unified entity for the community trapping groups and also participates in larger wide-scale work with neighbouring wildlife trusts, the Department of Conservation, Forest and Bird, and other conservation partners who are dedicated to making the Queenstown Lakes District Predator-Free.

The Department of Conservation met the remainder of those costs via a community hub grant over the past three years, but that funding runs out at the end of May and is no longer available. Q30. How will this investment in your project or organisation be of value to the wider community?

Investment in our administration costs provides excellent value for money. We currently have 724 volunteer trappers and 3,574 traps (up from 421 in 2017). There are approximately 42,888 trap checks done per annum and we dispatched over 6600 predators in the past year. A volunteer averages 6 trap checks per hour, so if they were paid \$25 per hour, then the value of those volunteers is \$178,700 each and every year. That is not including mileage, consumables, training, employment costs, trustee time, purchase of traps etc. We value our partnership with QLDC with most of our trapping undertaken on public land. We believe our goals are closely aligned, particularly Council's Climate and Biodiversity plan. We make a significant impact in reducing predator numbers in the Whakatipu basin to ensure our community and visitors are able to experience native wildlife. However, without Council's ongoing, and increased support, we will not have enough funding to continue our efforts, and that impact will be lost.

We have applied for grants with the Department of Conservation and Otago Regional Council. The criteria for both grants is very tight and not designed to cover administration costs so we are not hopeful that they will be successful. We apply for many grants to cover the costs of traps, consumables, and projects as that funding is more easily accessible. It is the operating funds that we are less able to secure.

The Whakatipu Wildlife Trust (WWT) was established in 2017 at the request of the Department of Conservation (DOC) and Queenstown Lakes District Council (QLDC). It brought together 12 trapping groups in existence at the time. Since then, we have added 60 new trapping groups.

Queenstown Lakes District Council (QLDC) has approved \$30,000 per annum community funding grant to Whakatipu Wildlife Trust (WWT) for the 21-22, 22-23 and 23-24 years. That funding provides approximately half of the administration costs for WWT each year. Our Trust is grateful to QLDC for this support.

The funds are used to meet the administrative costs of the Trust for example financial and accounting, website, compliance, events and education, promotion and marketing, insurance and our part-time executive officer's salary. The Department of Conservation met the remainder of those costs via a community hub grant over the past three years, but that funding runs out at the end of May and is no longer available.

You will be aware how difficult it is to seek grants for administration costs. Most grantors prefer to fund projects – they have a defined scope, a start and finish date, and defined outcomes, whereas administration costs have none of those parameters. However, how can an organisation deliver on projects if there is no funding to sustain its very existence and ability to deliver the work? QLDC's community fund is essential to enable organisations like ours to achieve our goals – in our case protection of our native wildlife.

Investment in our administration costs provides excellent value for money. We currently have 724 volunteer trappers and 3,574 traps (up from 421 in 2017). There are approximately 42,888 trap checks done per annum and we dispatched over 6600 predators

in the past year. A volunteer averages 6 trap checks per hour, so if they were paid \$25 per hour, then the value of those volunteers is \$178,700 each and every year. That is not including mileage, consumables, training, employment costs, trustee time, purchase of traps etc.

We value our partnership with QLDC with most of our trapping undertaken on public land. We believe our goals are closely aligned, particularly Council's Climate and Biodiversity plan. We make a significant impact in reducing predator numbers in the Whakatipu basin to ensure our community and visitors are able to experience native wildlife. However, without Council's ongoing, and increased support, we will not have enough funding to continue our efforts, and that impact will be lost.

We are seeking from Council the following:

- 1. That the community grant in the 2023-2024 increase from \$30,000 to \$50,000.
- 2. That for the 2024-2025, 2025-2026 and 2026-2027 years that Council grant \$70,000 to WWT to fund the administration costs needed to keep our Trust running.

It is disappointing to actually feel obliged to support what is in effect kicking the can down the road for some important and necessary projects which will only get more expensive with the resulting delay, but the Leaky Homes expense has dealt a difficult hand. Settling on a final average rate increase of as much as 13% is going to be a struggle for many. In relation to the leaky homes expense, I feel that (a), the magnitude of the expense means that the actual amount of the settlement cost, and the numerical \$ impact not just for this year but for the lifetime of the expense should be fully disclosed to ratepayers. and (b), that the Council, in conjunction with Local Government NZ, should be lobbying for a legislative change to remedy this iniquitous situation. I note that there is no mention in the Cap Ex items for the scheme to pipe storm water from the ponds above the source of Bullock Creek down to a swale in the Showgrounds. Has this plan been abandoned? If so, what is the Plan B to resolve the issue of storm water overflow into Bullock Creek? The current situation leaves Bullock Creek with ongoing exposure to storm water pollution with every heavy rain event, an untenable ongoing actuality.

Re the section on Demand and Population Assumptions, P34 ff: Average growth in population numbers is stated to be 3.2%, but over the past four years Council figures show that actual Upper Clutha resident numbers have grown by 23% which represents an annual growth of 5.4%. And since this period includes the Covid crisis years the trend rate is likely to be higher again. Clearly the 3.2% growth on which all the forward plan figures are predicated, is way too low. I rather think that the biggest implication of this lies in the inevitable massive infrastructure deficiency from capital works underinvestment. For many years now Council has been operating on forward growth estimates that have proven to be grossly deficient, which is why we are already seriously underinvested in infrastructure, and this situation is only going to get much worse (even more so when we are deferring significant projects in the current draft Plan). We are going to get further and further behind with each succeeding year. I note that the forward projection graph for Capital Expenditure shows us to be at a peak point now, then trending downwards in the coming years. That is totally wishful thinking, particularly in the light of the serious underestimations on growth. What to do???? The only affordable answer is to slow down growth. Some of the following options present themselves; 1. Pause any expansion of urban development zones, and even consider whether some existing zoned areas can be economically justified. 2. Increase the developer contribution for new urban developments so as to better keep pace with the true cost of providing infrastructure. It seems to me that the current arrangement is basically marginally costed, which results in much of the true costs being passed on to the existing rate payer base. 3. Review and adjust the current policy which is to accommodate and even encourage as much demand as possible in Visitor Arrivals. This is unsustainable on a number of levels, not just from the perspective of short and long term infrastructure inadequacy. The regional community is also desirous of a slow-down in growth (Ref Quality of Life Surveys), the environment is suffering (Ref Commissioner for the Environment Report, and other respected commentators such as Prof. James Higham), and it will disastrously overrun our commitment to carbon zero by 2030. Tourism demand management will inevitably bring disfavour from some sections of the business community, but it is of course this community segment which is benefitting from the current unsustainable trajectory. There are various ways in which this can be done; (a) Review at the earliest opportunity the Queenstown Airport statement of Intent to reflect the need for some demand management . (b) Withdraw support from the Queenstown and Wanaka Tourism promotion organisations. We do not need to promote tourism in the region as we already have a natural (over)sufficiency. (c) Rewrite the Regional policies on Tourism Development as they do not at all reflect the need for a certain level of demand management. This particular submission may seem out of scope for the 2023-2024 Plan, but it is fundamentally linked to Demand Projections, Capital Expenditure shortfalls and affordability, and Infrastructure adequacy/inadequacy. All of these things are the essence of the short term plan as well as longer term plan. The sooner a move is made to begin to deal with these issues, the better equipped we will be to stave off a crisis.

Furthermore, I wish to point out that the primary issue which gave rise to the upgrade plan, siltation and contamination of Bullock Creek, cannot be left unaddressed for anything like as much as seven years. The issues are known and acknowledged, and QLDC has been served with one abatement notice from the ORC on the matter of contaminated cischarge going into the headwaters from the developer pond overflow. Further breaches are inevitable until a proper fix is put in place. This must be addressed as a matter of urgency. I am led to believe that the current proposal to create a swale to filter contaminated overflow is not fully acknowledge as being proper fix, and if that is the case then a plan B needs to be prepared and implemented. Either way, the overflow needs to be piped away from the creek.

The carrot and stick approach to encouraging residents and visitors to use public or active transport, and discourage them from using individual light vehicles, is an entirely valid approach.

The approach to meeting the increasing inflationary costs of infrastructure investment of deferring proposed projects to later years is a valid approach in the current context. Albeit on investment in infrastructure costs that were poorly advised, including the downtown Queenstown redevelopment and the highly questionable Lake View Taumata project. That there is nothing in the Draft Annual Plan to materially address the growing affordable and worker housing crises is disappointing and concerning. Some mention of the proposed inclusionary zoning policy, the levy and/or rates income that it will realise, and potential housing initiatives that the income could fund should be included in the Annual Plan. That the residential and visitor growth projections are included without question or conditions in the draft annual plan, as they are in the Ten Year Plan, unrealistically commits QLDC and its ratepayers to perpetually chasing growth and whatever the cost of doing so will be. An estimate of what an affordable level of rating income will be for the community and a commensurately sustainably affordable level of infrastructure investment will be, would be more useful for the community take an informed approach to its future. The rate of residential population increase is disconcerting enough, but the rate and scale of projected increase in visitor numbers, and the infrastructure demands that they will bring, should be a matter of serious social, economic, and environmental concern for the council. A managed growth approach is going to be essential for QLDC, the economy, and the wider community to meet its sustainability and resilience objectives. Simply leaving the future of our communities to the vagaries of the various markets should no longer be an option. The objectives of the Regenerative Tourism Strategy and Climate and Biodiversity Plan 2022-2025 cannot meaningfully begin to be achieved while there is no effort to imagine or realise considerably more realistic managed growth trajectories. With the need to begin to manage growth in mind, the passive approach that QLDC takes to growth, through its Ten Year Plan, Draft Annual Plan, Regenerative Tourism Strategy, Climate and Biodiversity Plan, and its relationship to its super-shareholder ownership of Queenstown Airport Corporation (QAC), has to be seen to change to a more actively strategically sustainable mode. Although much of this will have to wait until the review of the Ten Year Plan later in 2023, a significant shift of approach can and should be signaled now by requiring a substantially higher dividend and a full rethink of QAC's proposed pro-growth development intentions.

a. Queenstown Airport Corporation has reported an after-tax profit of \$11.5 million, but is retaining almost half of that. Given the historically high rate increase proposed in the Draft Annual Plan, the profit of QLDC's main revenue-generating asset should be required to contribute substantially more to QLDC's income. A further \$6.7 million dividend would see around \$5 million in additional QLDC revenue, reducing the rates increase to below 10%, and requiring QAC to consider its currently unsustainable visitor and CO2-generating development pathway. b. The Draft Annual Plan does not seem to inform ratepayers of how long they will be meeting the costs of leaky building claims, other than "over several years" (p 24), leaving ratepayers uncertain and guessing. This is neither open nor transparent. The period over which the cost of the leaky building claim debt will be repaid should be included in the final Annual Plan.

We consider that the rise in the cost of an annual dog licence to over \$200 should not be necessary when, for example a similar licence in Invercargill costs \$50 and we suggest the model that Council is using for this service should be reviewed to see why the costs locally are so much higher than elsewhere. As an outlier settlement, Glenorchy does not have dog parks, council led dog walks, or regular animal patrols and the licence does not provide value for animal owners. Accordingly the costs are such that many will fail to register their animals.

We are concerned that deferring the planned water treatment plan for Glenorchy means that we will have to suffer fluctuating chlorine doses in our water for longer than is necessary. Council should look to make savings on operational expenses that will enable the debt of community facing capex to be funded so those projects that do have community support can proceed.

We request that a project to identify what is needed to provide continued safe berthing of boats is included in the waterways or community resilience budgets. The Glenorchy wharf is being encroached on by the Rees River Delta and may not be serviceable for many more years. Access by water is the lifeline that would and has met the needs of the community in emergency situations when the road is impassible. We request that financial provision is made to fund a generator in Glenorchy to improve our local civil defence capability and communications in the event that our power supplies are seriously impacted.

The Glenorchy community nursery has grown @5000 native trees to date and planting is underway. All this work is led by volunteers and we have reached the stage where to make best use of the facility we have built we need to fund a part time role to lead the nursery and we are aiming to fund this for 2 days a week, 40 weeks a year. \$10,000 will provide half of the funding required.

Funding will allow the work of the nursery and planting to be scaled up across the 8 ha area that the community have agreed should be restored to an indigenous landscape with pest species removed. this is a huge task that is beyond the capability of volunteers alone. One of the purposes of a paid coordinator role will be to secure regular income streams to build financial resilience into the day to day operation of the nursery - but we need 'seed funding' to start this process.

REPORTING ON 2022

Background

The Alpine Community Development Trust (ACDT) was established in 2003 as a grassroots charitable trust, set up to operate Community Networks Wānaka, our region's only social wellbeing resource hub. In 2016 the ACDT added community development services to the mix through a three-year grant from the DIA's Community Development Scheme which birthed LINK Upper Clutha, operating alongside but separately from Community Networks during that time. Now our organisation operates as one integrated unit, Community Networks/LINK, *providing the region's only one-stop community support and connection centre.*

Service offerings

In order to achieve ACDT's vision that "Upper Clutha people can thrive not just survive," we focus on these key service areas:

- 1. Foodbank and financial support
- 2. Government and community services
- 3. Health & wellbeing
- 4. Social work support

- 5. Collaboration
- 6. Community development
- 7. Events & training
- 8. Resources

Outcomes

Our <u>2022 Annual Report</u> is a great read and summarises the activities and impact Community Networks/LINK has made in the past year, with support from QLDC and other funders. Excerpted from this report as an appendix to this submission are the key outcomes of our work in *building resilient whānau and individuals*, and *building resilient and connected community*.

THANK YOU FOR QLDC FUNDING AND COLLABORATION

We are grateful for financial support from QLDC and are proud to be a key community partner. Council's responsibility for community wellbeing in all its dimensions (social, economic, cultural, environmental) is most effectively achieved through partnership with those on the ground, benefitting from the most local expertise and experience.

So much of our mahi at Community Networks/LINK is collaborative – working with partners from other community groups, social service agencies, health care, education. Not least among these is QLDC, who employs talented and energetic leaders we have been fortunate to work with in the following ways:

Upper Clutha Community Shuttle Trial – a groundbreaking, community-led first – we facilitated a threemonth trial of public transport in a region that has been clamouring for it. In recent years, the issue of public transport has been raised by young people, older people, and other vulnerable residents who do not have access to their own transport options. Commuters and others seeking an affordable option that addresses environmental concerns have also raised their voices. Our organisation researched, planned, and executed the trial but it would not have been possible without a number of partners, including QLDC (Marie Day supported our application for a grant from Otago Community Trust; Andrew Edgar and Hugo de Cosse Brissac provided transport support).

The goals of the 2022 trial were twofold: provide a short-term service and collect data for long-term regional transport planning by QLDC and Otago Regional Council. The results of the trial are summarised in our report <u>here</u>, and we are extending this data collection with a second trial in 2023, testing a slightly different model (increased frequency, revised route and timing). This is being financially supported through QLDC's Climate Action and Biodiversity Plan, Lake Wānaka Tourism's Destination Management Plan, and developed in partnership with ORC who is providing planning support as they did for the first trial. We have also submitted on ORC's Annual Plan requesting an increased commitment to and investment in public transport in the Upper Clutha.

Wānaka and Hāwea Libraries – it's been great to see the community development activities in library spaces and in ours. Team member Eve Marshall-Lea has been instrumental in our Community Garden at the Hub project, including creating a seed library; Paula Mitchell keeps up to speed about our services so that Library staff can point people needing support or connection in the right direction; the Wānaka and Hāwea Libraries' digital drop-in sessions align with our Reconnecting Seniors kaupapa.

Welcoming Communities – We've had a great partnership with Silvia Dancose, reaching out to the increasingly diverse residents in the Upper Clutha. Silvia has done a wonderful job engaging with these residents, many of whom gathered at our May Connection Café, "What's Happening for Migrants," to introduce the Welcoming Communities programme. This was followed up with the November Welcoming Communities Hui, facilitated by CN/LINK and providing a valuable opportunity to discuss how to progress the inclusive goals of WC.

Wānaka Recreation Centre – Allan Wainright and Penny Batchelor regularly participate in our Connection Cafes, and we mutually promote each other's mahi – all of which helps connect and create belonging for our residents.

Parks & Recreation – Diana Manson is a star contributor to collaborative efforts, offering her expertise to our Community Gardening team and leading Community Kitchen sessions which we organise and host.

Food Security Network – the ultimate in collaboration, the network only exists because of the contributions of all those involved in food resilience and security, including QLDC's Diana Manson, Bill Nicoll, Eve Marshall-Lea, and Dr. Compost (Ben Elms) alongside others from Wastebusters, WAO, Grow Wānaka. From Produce Stands to Community Kitchens to growing education, this group is reducing waste and increasing food security.

Community Partnerships Team – Marie Day and her colleagues are in regular communication with our team, who support Council community work through facilitation, promotion, engagement, project planning, and execution. We congratulate Marie on the increasingly strategic focus of this Council on community partnerships and development.

We encourage elected members to value your staff as much as we do, with appropriate investment in their mahi.

Community Networks/LINK receives the following funding from the current 2021-31 Ten Year Plan:

We have been fortunate to receive increased funding from other sources in recent years, especially in response to Covid-related support and connection needs. The Ministry of Social Development has been the major source of this funding, directly enabling support through our Foodbank and food resilience mahi, our Social Worker, and community connection initiatives. However this contract has not yet been renewed, which means we will be operating under financial uncertainty in the next few years.

Community Networks/LINK is a nimble, adaptable organisation that continually evolves to meet both needs and opportunities in the community. We have achieved an enormous amount with QLDC funding. Looking ahead, we hope to continue as QLDC's trusted key partner in the Upper Clutha, which will likely mean an increase in our funding request to the Ten Year Plan. Continuing to provide the support and connection services that have become mainstays is key, as is being proactive and anticipating the next community-led development projects that we can activate. Valuing our staff at a time when cost of living has increased for them as much as the community members they serve is also important.

We hope you have enjoyed this recap of our mahi. Preparing an Annual Plan submission is always a great opportunity for reflection on what has been achieved, and how much there is still to do! We look forward to an ongoing, fruitful relationship with you as our Council, and thank you for your support.


REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES STRATEGIC PRIORITY 1: BUILDING RESILIENT WHANAU AND INDIVIDUALS

The broader impact of Covid on the community has been felt far and wide and this, along with the rising cost of living, has resulted in an increase in pressure on the community. Our role as the region's one-stop community support and connection centre was integral to the wellbeing of the community.

Offering direct support to clients as they present at our centre is a unique aspect of our organisation.

This includes:

- Foodbank and financial support (vouchers and one-off household costs such as firewood and power);
- Connection to a range of government and community services;
- Face-to-face support from our Social Worker;
- Health and wellbeing resources and support, e.g. with the cost of private counselling.



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BUILDING RESILIENT WHÀNAU AND INDIVIDUALS

Foodbank and financial support

We provide access to a range of practical support to help with day-to-day needs, including food parcels, vouchers and assistance with living costs through the Community Support Fund. Of the 303 approved referrals to this fund in 2022, 54% identified their main contributing stressor as financial hardship, followed by mental health at 36%. 14 families were supported with school-related expenses such as uniforms and stationery through the No Child Misses out element of the fund.

Government and community services

Our community support and connection centre continued to provide a gateway to government and non-government agencies, local services and social support, including monthly Community Law; IRD; MSD Superannuation; Immigration; and JP clinics.

CN/LINK coordinates the Meals on Wheels delivery in the Upper Clutha region and noticed a gap in service provision in 2022 so arranged meetings with relevant stakeholders to determine a system for meeting the need in the community. We also coordinate the bookings and administration for the Wheels to Dunstan transport service (which connects to the Health Shuttle to Dunedin Hospital) for medical appointments.

Health and wellbeing

Our new website enables us to store and maintain health and wellbeing resources which help people access support, such as free resources, helpline information and our Counselling and Mental Health Services database.

Social work support

Our Social Worker engaged with 210 clients in 2022 and met with 120 other individuals to offer brief advice or connection to further support. The main issues were broadly welfare/economic related, driven frequently by health issues, family breakdowns and restructure. These predominant themes are frequently interrelated.

Employment is easy to obtain in the area, but housing/accommodation remains a major barrier to being able to live and work here. The cost of living is increasing and access to formal health care services has not changed or improved in 2022. Covid has had a slightly lesser impact on social work service in 2022, as it has become more endemic than pandemic.

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STRATEGIC PRIORITY 2: BUILDING RESILIENT AND CONNECTED COMMUNITY

Collaboration

Community Networks/LINK continues to facilitate collaboration among social sector groups and across community segments through bi-monthly Upper Clutha Interagency meetings. We are an active participant in community action initiatives, including the Wānaka Alcohol Group; Social Services Snapshot; Champion for Older Persons Group (now Reconnecting Seniors Network); Food Security Network; Central Lakes Mental Health and Addiction Network; and the Suicide Post/Prevention Group.

We have also maintained close communication with local organisations including neighbourhood associations, Chamber of Commerce, Lake Wānaka Tourism, QLDC, Wao Aotearoa, WAI Wānaka, Emergency Management and the social sector.

Community group support

We have supported community groups in their development and evolution with advice on legal formation, funding, strategic planning and marketing. The Community Group Support Fund helped boost the capability of 7 community groups in 2022.

BUILDING RESILIENT AND CONNECTED COMMUNITY

Community development

We work to enhance community wellbeing and resilience by enabling action on key grassroots community issues. Key projects in 2022 included:

- The Family Support Programme, which commenced in early 2022 and supported 10 local families with pre-school age children. Volunteers offered companionship and assistance with household tasks for between 2 weeks and 8 months.
- The Community Shuttle Trial, which ran for approximately 3 months and transported 665 people between Hāwea, Hāwea Flat, Albert Town, Three Parks and Wānaka.
- The Reconnecting Seniors project, which commenced in November 2022 to encourage and create opportunities for seniors to get and stay connected, in the community and at home. Activities so far include 65 Christmas giftboxes going out to isolated seniors before Christmas, monthly coffee mornings, marketing support for Dell Taylor/St John Saturday lunches; and networking with providers and community groups/representatives to build a picture of everything that is happening for seniors in the Upper Clutha. Activities in the near future include a monthly calendar of activities and events for seniors, and a midwinter music and food social event.
- The Food Security Network collaborated on a wide range of projects and initiatives including the launch of more community produce stands, a three-day Neighbours Day event, a stall at the EAT Wānaka event led by Wao Aotearoa, a community kitchen and a number of growing workshops.
 We worked with QLDC and Wao on their food resilience project by co-hosting a two-day food resilience workshop.
- Life Skills Classes were provided at Mt. Aspiring College, to enable youth engagement and citizenship and facilitate youth input into Council-led future-planning work.
- In September 2022, we developed the model for our Community Gardens at the Hub to increase productivity for the Foodbank. The boxes are maintained by volunteers who, in exchange for their time, receive fresh produce and monthly community growing workshops led by volunteer gardening experts. Workshops so far have included how to grow leafy greens and how to care for tomatoes.
- The Connection Café (free drop-in networking events connecting people and providing information and resources on various community-building topics) in May, 'What's happening for migrants in the Upper Clutha?' focused on QLDC's Welcoming Communities initiative and migrant support, partnering with QLDC.
- Calm Minds offered a programme supporting parents of primary school aged children.

There are dramatic increases in all QLDC charges, mainly because of the leaky buildings problem and these charges, particularly rates are going to impact on all Albert Town property owners. Families are struggling and when these rates increases come into effect the financial stress will become even more profound. The deferment of maintenance because of lack of funds means projects will be more costly in the future. It would appear that more leaky buildings have emerged in Queenstown and it is totally unacceptable to expect rate payers to keep paying for repairs. Deferred maintenance is going to also impact as infrastructures deteriorate though lack of attention. QLDC has a relatively small population base and there is a limit to how much ratepayers can be expected to pay.

The Three Lakes Cultural Trust (TLCT) was created in 2019 to support and encourage arts and culture in the Queenstown Lakes District in ways that contribute to the cultural, social and economic vitality and resilience of the District. The Trust's mission is for our place to be a powerhouse of arts, culture and creativity, supporting and facilitating its growth through infrastructure capability and capacity. The Trust's values are to be innovative, inclusive, respectful, collaborative and visionary. In early 2020, TLCT commissioned London and New York based global consultancy firm AEA Consulting to produce the District's first independent Cultural Masterplan. This was publicly released on 28 February, 2020. TLCT's Masterplan vision clearly outlined a roadmap and gave voice to arts, culture, and creativity important role as a mechanism for both community wellbeing and economic benefit to the entire district. The past three years have seen some exciting projects brought to fruition and an acknowledgment of the importance of the arts for the Queenstown Lakes District. To help the QLD communities understand both the opportunities and needs that exist, these initial projects have been primarily philanthropically supported. Following the launch of the Masterplan, TLCT delivered Renew Arts, a multi-day arts and events project in both Queenstown and Wanaka that provided an opportunity to regenerate and celebrate the arts community. Additionally, we have seen a broader appreciation in our local schools for creative expression as a direct result of the delivery of the TLCT's Arts in Schools programme. More than 800 primary school students were involved in this district-wide initiative. A partnership with QLDC was formed in late 2020 to explore the feasibility of an arts and cultural facility. A small independent team consulted with more than 50 groups to understand the needs (and wants) of the community, and then submitted a proposal to the 2021-2031 Ten Year Plan process for a trust to be established to fundraise the fitout and operate a facility, along with QLDC supporting the lease of the space for 10 years. In May 2022 Te Atamira, Tāhuna, Queenstown's first fit-for-purpose arts and culture space opened its doors to the community with 22 spaces for creativity. These include an art gallery, two dance studios, performance spaces, a recording studio, music teaching and rehearsal rooms, a pottery studio, art workshop and a community project space. It offers a wide-ranging programme of exhibitions, workshops, classes, performances, events and talks designed for everyone to be creative, every day. Community Connections - TLCT has worked to build a comprehensive database dedicated to the local arts scene. Through social media and digital marketing, TLCT has provided consistent news to the community, including capacity building & amp; funding opportunities, upcoming events, sector news and community highlights within the arts. In mid March 2023 TLCT launched Te Wahi Toi, meaning The Arts Place in te reo Maori. The development of this online platform for all things arts, culture and creativity that covers the entire district is in direct response to the Masterplans recommendation to invest in creative capacity, enabling growth, learning and access to the arts through a digital hub. Te Wāhi Toi is the digital meeting place that now exists to nurture the growth of arts, culture and creativity in our community. Te Wahi Toi offers a central place for our arts and culture scene to connect via a free and easily accessible platform that promotes, shares and supports all artists and creative events across the District. Our funding application is to support this district wide resource that will connect our arts community and our visitors.

Te Wāhi Toi is a district wide initiative, a resource designed to increase awareness and engagement with the vibrant arts sector that exists within our community. Not only are the arts an economic driver, they also have clear links to individual and community wellbeing. As reported in the Manatū Taonga Ministry for Culture & amp; Heritage 'Long Term Insights Briefing' document presented in December 2022, the data related to the economic and social benefits to the community equate to: Economically: - In the year to March 2021, the arts and creative sector generated \$10,851 billion. - The sector represents 3.3% of the NZ economy. - Between 2000 and 2021, the economic contribution of the sector more than doubled (+121%) in real terms, outstripping the economy as a whole (+70%). Socially: - The sector creates substantial social and cultural value. The 2016 General Social Survey in NZ found that New Zealanders who took part in cultural or recreational activities were more likely satisfied with their lives compared to those who didn't. In addition to the above, the Manatū Taonga Ministry for Culture and Heritage and the Australia Council for the Arts released the 'Trans-Tasman Valuing the Arts Report' in December 2022. The report details the findings of a joint research project about the arts and their contribution to wellbeing, communities and social inclusion in Australia and Aotearoa and advocates for an ambitious repositioning of arts and culture within our society.

Introduction

I am writing to the 2023-2024 Annual Plan in my capacity as the Chief Operating Officer at the Three Lakes Cultural Trust, a charitable Trust established to support and encourage arts and culture in the Queenstown Lakes District in ways that contribute to the cultural, social and economic vitality and resilience of the District.

The Three Lakes Trust has a vision for the district to be a powerhouse of arts, culture and creativity, supporting and facilitating its growth through infrastructure capability and capacity; with values being innovative, inclusive, respectful, collaborative and visionary. Which supports QLDC's commitment to 'Breathtaking Creativity Whakaohooho Auahataka' as part of Vision Beyond 2050.

Arts, culture & creativity are a critical part of successful place making and will be integral to the success of the recently released Destination Management Plan, Travel to a Thriving Future and is integral to the economic diversification of our district, as creative placemaking has been proven to have liveability, diversity and economic development outcomes.

Aside from the social, well-being and cultural benefits of the arts, the economic benefits are well recognised in places where creativity thrives.

According to the Manatū Taonga Ministry for Culture & Heritage 'Long Term Insights Briefing Report₍₁₎, presented in December 2022, in the year to March 2021, the arts and creative sector generated \$10,851 billion with the sector representing 3.3% of NZ economy.

Submission to the 2023 - 2024 Annual Plan

- 1. TLCT would like to acknowledge the strong leadership of QLDC that has enabled the delivery of Te Atamira, Tahūna Queenstown's first multi arts facility that was a direct response to the districts first independent Cultural Master Plan⁽²⁾, endorsed by council in 2020, that identified a need for purpose-built cultural infrastructure.
- 2. We support the work being undertaken by Lake Wānaka Arts and Culture Charitable Trust to determine the feasibility of a Lake Wānaka Arts and Cultural to build a new best practice arts and cultural facility in Wānaka to serve the region — to be a 'home' for our creative and cultural activities, especially for mana whenua. The Wānaka Arts and Culture Centre will be a community heart –a place for meeting and interaction, a place which enjoys a wide sense of community ownership, and which contributes to the vitality of Wānaka.
- 3. Due to the Three Lakes Cultural Trusts' track record, the Trust is recognised by the Regional Arts Network Aotearoa RANA⁽³⁾ as one of 13 regional arts organizations within Aoteatora. RANA members work to provide strategic direction and support for sustainable arts, culture & heritage development.

In the current annual plan there is no mention of QLDC's proposal to develop an Arts, Culture and Heritage Strategy. Due to the Trust's strong working relationships with at a national and local level and a track record of delivering initiatives as set by the Cultural, we encourage QLDC to work closely with the TLCT on the development of any future plans through the establishment of an independent arts advisory group that will bring the relevant experience required to develop a strategy with a shared vision for arts, culture and heritage across the district.

Referring to the Vision Beyond 2050 'Breathtaking Creativity Whakaohooho Auahataka', Te Wāhi Toi provides a direct solution to the community outcomes set in the vision, including being an economy that supports arts, culture and heritage industries, while also providing a space for artists and art lovers to unite. Through our community grant application, we ask that QLDC supports the annual operational costs of this platform.

Background on the Three Lakes Cultural Trust

The Three Lakes Cultural Trust (TLCT) was created in 2019 to support and encourage arts and culture in the Queenstown Lakes District in ways that contribute to the cultural, social and economic vitality and resilience of the District. The Trust's mission is for our place to be a powerhouse of arts, culture and creativity, supporting and facilitating its growth through infrastructure capability and capacity. The Trust's values are to be innovative, inclusive, respectful, collaborative and visionary.

In early 2020, TLCT commissioned London and New York based, global consultancy firm AEA Consulting to produce the District's first independent Cultural Masterplan⁽²⁾. Endorsed by Council, this was publicly released on 28 February, 2020.

TLCT's Masterplan vision clearly outlined a roadmap and gave voice to arts, culture, and creatives' important role as a mechanism for both community wellbeing and economic benefit to the entire district.

Following the launch of the Masterplan, TLCT delivered **RenewArt**, a multi-day arts and events project in both Queenstown and Wānaka that provided an opportunity to regenerate and celebrate the arts community. Additionally, TLCT has seen a broader appreciation in our local schools for creative expression as a direct result of the delivery of the TLCT's **Arts in Schools programme**. More than 800 primary school students were involved in this district-wide initiative.

A partnership with QLDC was formed in late 2020 to explore the feasibility of an arts and cultural facility. A small independent team consulted with more than 50 groups to understand the needs (and wants) of the community, and then submitted a proposal to the 2021-2031 Ten Year Plan process for a trust to be established to fundraise the fitout and operate a facility, along with QLDC supporting the lease of the space for 10 years.

In May 2022 Te Atamira, Tāhuna, Queenstown's first fit-for-purpose arts and culture space opened its doors to the community with 22 spaces for creativity. It offers a wide-ranging programme of exhibitions, workshops, classes, performances, events and talks designed for everyone to be creative, every day.

Community Connections - TLCT has worked to build a comprehensive database dedicated to the local arts scene. Through social media and digital marketing, TLCT has provided consistent news to the community, including capacity building & funding opportunities, upcoming events, sector news and community highlights within the arts.

And finally, as noted in our submission above, point 3, TLCT has now launched Te Wāhi Toi, the online meeting place for arts, culture and creativity across the district.

In summary, we encourage QLDC to support the artists, makers, performers and creative thinkers in our district, as creativity not only benefits the cultural, social and economic vitality and resilience of the district, but it also allows one to imagine a better future.

What is absent from the draft Annual Plan is the increased budget lines to help decarbonise the tourism sector by 2030, a goal that was endorsed by the Council in February. While we recognise that this is not strictly a Council Policy, it does align with Vision Beyond 2050 as well as our Climate and Biodiversity Plan. The later was only mentioned briefly in the introduction to the Annual Plan and there was little, if any budget allocated to the acceleration necessary to attain science based reduction targets. We agree that all non-essential CAPEX spend should be deferred. However, we need to invest more in active travel, public transport, OPEX for the teams implementing the CBP and support community organisations focusing on behaviour change for our community, whether they are focusing on food resilience, biodiversity, water or climate action.





The following is my submission to Council's Annual Plan 2023-24 for consideration in your deliberations.

During 2022 the Harris family obtained Council Consent to undertake restorations of their family plots in the Wanaka Cemetery, one in particular being over one hundred years old,

During restorations it became clear in one instance that these plots, being in the historic section of the cemetery are in an area which has open vehicle access and could be a target for vandalism at some future time.

I am not aware of any current Management Plan being in place for the Wanaka Cemetery and now may be the opportune time to upgrade any future management of the Wanaka Cemetery. My concern at present is the protection of graves in the historic area.

I have had preliminary discussions with Tarsy Koentges Councils Parks Officer and it appears that much discussion or consultation may have to take place before any improvements could be implemented, I consider that this may be too late to avoid damage to existing plots.

It is quite clear that much of the work carried out previously by Council in the Cemetery grounds has been done in a piece meal manner with less than satisfactory results, the placing of all the big rocks in the grounds is a good example of that. It has to be noted that the Dunedin Company who did the restorations on our family plots were somewhat astounded by some of the maintenance work carried out by Council in the Cemetery Grounds, at such a glorious site.

I request Council seriously consider to proceed with some sort of Management Plan for the Wanaka Cemetery as soon possible.
