

Take the Quality of Life survey and help plan for a better tomorrow.

We'd love to hear from you in our fifth annual Quality of Life survey.

The survey gathers information that helps Council and public service providers understand more about the current issues and challenges facing our communities. Together we use these insights to plan for a better tomorrow, and ultimately improve the quality of life of our residents.

QLDC has worked with partners at Destination Queenstown and Lake Wānaka Tourism to develop questions about the visitor economy, and has also engaged Te Whatu Ora Southern (formerly the DHB) to help shape health and wellbeing questions.

The whole thing has been streamlined this year so it only takes 15-20 minutes to complete. Something to do over a cuppa!

It doesn't matter if you've completed the survey in previous years – a lot can change in 12 months so taking part every year provides an up-to-date snapshot of what life is like for people living in our district.

Past survey results have helped inform projects such as the Climate and Biodiversity Plan and the Queenstown Lakes Homes Strategy as well as guiding Council decisions including the QLDC 2021-2031 Ten Year Plan.

Last year's survey found that overall quality of life was rated as extremely good (26%) or good (50%), while 18% said their quality of life was average, and 6% poor or extremely poor. While the impacts of COVID-19 were still being felt across the district in 2021, the results showed respondents were re-adjusting to a new sense of normal.

What will this year's survey tell us? We'll let you know in the new year.

Your new Council

Whilst final results had not been confirmed before this issue of Scuttlebutt went to print, preliminary results announced on Sunday 9 October all but confirmed Glyn Lewers had been elected as the new Queenstown Lakes District Mayor.

Again based on these preliminary results that accounted for around 90% of returned votes, Craig (Ferg) Ferguson, Lisa Guy and Neeta Shetty were elected to the Arrowtown-Kawarau Ward, with Matt Wong, Esther Whitehead, Gavin Bartlett and Niki Gladding elected to the Queenstown-Whakatipu Ward.

Quentin Smith, Barry Bruce, Lyal Cocks and Cody Tucker were elected as Wānaka-Upper Clutha Ward Councillors, with the seats on the Wānaka-Upper Clutha Community Board secured by Simon Telfer, Chris Hadfield, John Wellington and Linda Joll.

The inaugural meeting of the new Council, when new elected members will be sworn in, was pencilled in for Thursday 20 October.

Seeing the forest for the trees

Residents and visitors to the Queenstown Lakes are passionate about the many wonderful trees that call our district home, and they want to see them protected for future generations.

That's why we're thrilled our new Tree Policy 2022 was adopted in August. It sets in place robust criteria to ensure trees aren't unnecessarily removed.

AS A RESULT, TREES ON PUBLIC LAND WILL NOT BE REMOVED:

To minimise obstruction of views.

To minimise obstruction of commercial or advertising signage.

To reduce leaf or fruit litter and other debris.

To reduce shading.

For contributing to allergenic or irritant responses (unless certain criteria are met).

When the risk posed by the tree is deemed acceptable when assessed via the policy.

In the unfortunate event where a tree does have to be removed, the new policy specifies that it must be replaced with two trees. It also provides guidance on the types of trees Council will plant, how we'll keep them happy and healthy, and how staff and other workers should operate around them.

Adopt a local tree this summer

If this summer is anything like last year we might be in for a few dry months. And without regular rainfall young trees on your street and in reserves nearby may end up desperate for a drink of water.

Trees are essential to the future of our district and the planet. So please consider adopting a tree near your house and watering it regularly, especially when rain's been taking an extended holiday.

Planning for more affordable housing

Formal consultation is now open on a proposal to introduce Inclusionary Housing rules into the Proposed District Plan to help more people access affordable housing in the district.

The proposal would require most new residential subdivisions and developments to pay an 'affordable housing financial contribution'.

This money would be collected by Council and provided to the Queenstown Lakes Community Housing Trust (or another registered Community Housing Provider) as an ongoing funding stream. This will support their incredible work providing access to affordable housing.

Housing is one of the biggest challenges our community faces. It's also at the heart of creating secure, connected and caring communities, jobs and a diverse economy.

This proposal is really important because it will support access to affordable housing for low-moderate earners, helping to attract and retain skilled workers to the district. It also helps people to stay within the district, rather than living further afield in cheaper locations and commuting long distances to work.

Since 2003, we've successfully used inclusionary housing as a way of securing affordable housing contributions from developers on a case-by-case basis. The proposed rules will formalise that requirement providing more certainty that the construction of affordable housing can continue.

This is a complex but important topic for everyone in the district. To help people understand what's proposed we've summarised some key points opposite and have also provided some more detailed frequently asked questions at **www.qldc.govt.nz/inclusionary-housing**. The proposed rules are also available on the webpage for those who wish to get right into the detail.

SUMMARY OF KEY FACTS

At this stage this is a proposal subject to formal consultation underway.

The proposal may change as a result of submissions.

The proposed rules **do not apply** until Council makes a decision on the plan change; this will take some time.

The proposed financial contribution **will not apply in the following areas** (this is because a pre-existing agreement to provide affordable housing contributions has already been made with developers):

Jacks Point (including Hanleys Farm), Bullendale, Coneburn, Arrowtown Retirement Village, Northlake, Queenstown Country Club, Longview, Hikuwai, Riverside Park, Peninsula Bay, Allenby Farms, Quail Rise, Shotover Country, Homestead Bay, Tomasi.

The proposed 'affordable housing financial contribution' is important to support the vital work of the Queenstown Lakes Community Housing Trust (or another registered Community Housing Provider).

Since 2007, the Trust has built and delivered a total of eight housing developments (119 homes) on land received through an inclusionary housing-type process, which along with other homes purchased has helped 244 local households remain in the area. Further housing developments (totalling over 100 homes) are also underway at Northlake, Lake Hāwea and Arrowtown.

SUMMARY OF HOW THE PROPOSED CONTRIBUTION WOULD WORK:

The proposed 'affordable housing financial contribution' would be payable either at the time of residential subdivision approval and/or when building consent is issued for a new build (including apartments in business and mixed use areas). The contribution will not apply to residential flats located on an existing house site.

THE PROPOSED CONTRIBUTION FOR A SUBDIVISION WOULD BE

New subdivisions that create vacant residential lots within existing urban areas 5% of the additional serviced lots created, to be provided to the Council as either a transfer of land or as an equivalent monetary contribution

Residential subdivisions in a Settlement Zone, Rural-Residential Zone, Wakatipu Basin Rural Amenity Zone Lifestyle Precinct or Special Zone 1% of the anticipated sales value of the additional lot(s), as defined in the proposed provisions The proposed contribution for a **new house in urban areas** would depend on whether a contribution has already been paid by the developer that completed the subdivision.

Where new houses are to be built on lots that have not already been subject to an affordable housing contribution (for example building on a vacant lot that was created before the proposed rules come into effect), the contribution would be the lesser of either:

- > 2% of the anticipated sales value of the additional house(s) created; or
- > a set rate of \$150 per square metre of the net increase in residential floorspace.

For example: a new house on a vacant lot with a floor area of 150m² and estimated value of \$800,000 would trigger a contribution of \$16,000.

A \$1.5 million new house with a floor area of 250m² would trigger a contribution of \$30,000.

Public transport trial for the Upper Clutha

People in the Upper Clutha are strongly encouraged to get on board with a trial public transport link connecting Wānaka, Albert Town, Hāwea Flat and Lake Hāwea.

The three-month trial has been developed by Community Networks/LINK and will be delivered by local transport provider Yello!.

Anyone can book a ride, but the timetable has been developed to meet the needs of three demographics in particular: seniors travelling to and from Wānaka during the day for appointments or

shopping, young people connecting with friends or attending after-school activities, and commuters getting to and from work.

"We accept that the shuttle cannot be all things to all people," said LINK Community Development Coordinator Joanna Perry. "But this trial is as much about data collection as it is about providing a service – so, if the current service is not meeting your needs, tell us why!"

Joanna thanked QLDC, Otago Regional Council, local businesses and individuals for their support and advice, and Otago Community Trust for helping to fund the trial.

Yello! Owner and Operator Ramash Swamy said he was committed to working with community organisations to achieve local climate change initiatives and transport solutions. The shuttle – a custom-built, 13-seat Mercedes Sprinter with wheelchair hoist, space for larger luggage items and a bike rack – runs Mondays, Wednesday and Fridays until 21 December. All fares cost just \$2 and seats must be booked in advance.





HOW TO JOIN THE 1,000 BOOKS BEFORE SCHOOL PROGRAMME

Come along to our launch event or drop into any one of our eight library branches across the district. Simply ask about the programme and you'll be given a bright fun booklet so you and your child can get started straight away!

Kiki the Kea, our library mascot, will guide you through the programme while providing helpful information about our Children's Libraries' services. The booklet is filled with inspirational quotes and encouraging tips. It also has a reading log so you and your little one can track your journey to 1,000 books.





WHAT DOES THE PROGRAMME AIM TO DEVELOP?

- > Bonding snuggling up to read a book signals safety and emotional connection.
- > Emotional learning babies learn from expressions and tonal qualities of voice.
- > Routines babies thrive on knowing what comes next. Incorporating reading into a routine can help children prepare for whatever is next, like bedtime or naptime.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?

There are fantastic educational benefits including an understanding of math concepts, phonological awareness (how different sounds come together to form speech and words) and exposure to vocabulary. Reading helps our children make connections between information in books and their own lives. It's our goal to encourage a lifelong love of reading for our little ones and give them a readiness for school learning.

In a nutshell, this programme is a great equaliser providing all babies, regardless of socio-economic background, with a FREE library card, and a FREE programme. This is a great opportunity to make a start on your little one's literacy journey with the help of whānau and friends.

This programme hopes to instil a love of reading, a celebration of togetherness and an opportunity for families to take a mindful moment, spend time together and share a story.

Putting down roots

Queenstown Arterial update

The Kā Huanui a Tāhuna team is making good progress building Stage 1 of the Queenstown Town Centre Arterial Boad.

So far we've completed 25% of all construction and we're on track to complete 40% by Christmas. Some highlights include:

- > Installation of a new stormwater line down Suburb Street and construction of a new outfall structure to manage the flow of stormwater into Lake Whakatipu.
- > Undergrounding of electricity lines and new water mains along Melbourne Street.
- New water mains along Frankton Road, Beetham Street, Ballarat Street and Henry Street.

Over the next six months we'll be starting work on the new intersection at Henry Street / Gorge Road. The first stage of work involves digging deep trenches to upgrade all the underground services. To do this as quickly and safely as possible we'll need to close Gorge Road between Stanley and Weaver Streets. A detour will be available via Robins Road. The closure will be in place from 25 October until June 2023, although it will reopen temporarily for the Queenstown Marathon and busy Christmas and New Year period.

PLAN AHEAD if you're traveling through town.

ORC rule change on earthworks

Otago Regional Council's (ORC) latest urban provisions for residential developments aim to reduce any adverse effects on water quality. The new Plan Change 8 (PC8) provisions to ORC's Regional Plan: Water for Otago became operative on 3 September following a recent Environment Court decision.

ORC General Manager Policy and Science Anita Dawe said they will enable the council to have better oversight of earthworks, ensuring sediment doesn't enter the water network.

"For residential earthworks to be a permitted activity, developers must not expose more than 2,500m² in any consecutive 12-month period per landholding, and the earthworks must not be within ten metres of a body of water, drain, water race or coastal marine area," she said.

"If developers cannot meet these and other requirements they will need to get a resource consent."

The PC8 urban topics changes will also affect operators of reticulated storm and wastewater systems.

New stormwater flood hazard maps for Wānaka


New stormwater flood hazard maps for Wānaka will help Council and residents better understand and plan for flood risk in the area.

The maps identify potential flood risk from extreme rainfall events to properties in the Wānaka and Albert Town areas.

The maps are accessible online from **www.qldc.govt.nz/stormwater-hazard-maps**. Residents and property owners can zoom in on any property and identify the potential flood risk.

QLDC Strategy and Asset Planning Manager Mark Baker said similar assessments are being completed for all townships across the district and are due to be released in 2023 and 2024.

"We completed the modelling to better understand the flood hazard in the district. The maps will help inform



our stormwater investment programme and help the community to understand possible flood risk in their area and for their property," Mr Baker said.

Two maps have been produced based on the same modelling results.

One map indicates possible water depth caused by stormwater flooding. The other indicates any potential hazard to people, property, or vehicles, and is based on a combination of water depth and velocity.

The maps were created using a computer model that calculates how, when and where the rainwater flows accounting for climate change, the topography of the land and stormwater drainage, such as pipes, basins, creeks, bridges, culverts, and soak pits.

Environmental factors, such as soil characteristics, and where rainwater moves slowly or soaks into the ground, is also factored into the model.

Property owners within the flood assessment area have been sent a letter to advise them that potential flood information will appear on a Land Information Memorandum (LIM) if one is requested for their property.

The flood assessment area can be seen in the map opposite.

"Property owners don't need to take any specific action as a result of this modelling. However, we do recommend they take a look at the maps and understand any potential risk, especially if they have plans to subdivide or build. This new information will be used to inform consent processes and our consent officers will be able to provide advice for each specific situation as it will depend on the property and proposal."

Mr Baker said the modelling would further inform QLDC's stormwater investment programme.

"Currently we have multiple stormwater projects underway in Wānaka and across the district. Including the upgrades taking place at Stone Street, Bullock Creek, Aubrey Road, Rata Street, and Anderson Road in Upper Clutha. This ranges from pipe upgrades to new soakage pits, a stormwater detention facility and stormwater flow diversion and treatment. We also have money earmarked in the 2021-2031 Ten Year Plan to investigate what further stormwater investment might be required."

New radios boost resilience

Community Response Groups (CRG) in the Central Otago and Queenstown Lakes districts have received a boost to their emergency communications.

Ten new radio sets have been purchased and will be distributed across ten CRGs in the region – from Lake Hāwea to Glenorchy, and other communities in between. Each set includes a base unit and two hand-held radios.

The groups, which are trained to support their communities in the event of an emergency, will receive radio training from Emergency Management Otago.

The radios will provide greater resilience and connection for communities who may be cut off in a disaster if the usual communication networks fail.

This project was funded by the district councils and Central Lakes Trust.

Camp responsibly this summer

Summer's coming and with it the great Kiwi pastime of camping.

As we welcome visitors from overseas and elsewhere in Aotearoa New Zealand, here's a reminder to camp responsibly and protect our environment.

Responsible campers take only photos and leave only footprints, helping keep our communities and natural environment free from pollution and waste.

We know most campers want to do the right thing, and if they've got the right information they will. So we've compiled a list of all the key rules do's and don'ts.

- > Ensure your vehicle is certified self-contained before freedom camping.
- > Do not freedom camp in an area where it's prohibited.
- > Always use your own facilities for bathing, washing and going to the loo or use a public facility.
- > Always use a designated wastewater dump station for your sewage and sink water.
- > Dispose of rubbish in public bins or at transfer stations in the district.
- > Always park in the areas specifically designated for your type of vehicle.

HOW TO REPORT POOR CAMPING BEHAVIOUR

The first option runs through Te Kararo Queenstown Gardens using existing pathways whilst the second runs down Coronation Drive to Stanley Street and around to Camp Street.

Flush with pride

There's an easy way to help keep things flowing smoothly through our wastewater system: remember to only flush the three Ps – pee, poo and paper.

Anything else will ultimately lead to blocked pipes and pump stations which can cost a huge pile to repair. That means no paper towels, tissues, rags or wet wipes down the loo.

Understandably, antibacterial wipes have been in high demand as people take extra hygiene precautions due to the pandemic. Whilst many of these products say they can be flushed, that's simply not the case here.

We all have a part to play in protecting our environment and keeping the three waters infrastructure flowing smoothly, so please think before you flush and stick to the three Ps.

It's time to say goodbye to some single-use and hard-to-recycle plastics, something QLDC supported in our submission to the Ministry for the Environment. The government has recently made the manufacture and sale of several products in NZ illegal. These include polystyrene takeaway food and drink packaging, PVC food trays, plastic cotton-wool buds and drink stirrers, and plastic with pro-degradant additives. More Good Yarns for mental health

We all love a good yarn but some of us need one more than ever right now.

So it's good to know that Te Hau Toka Southern Lakes Wellbeing Group and Head Light Trust are stepping up efforts to help the local community with 15 more GoodYarn workshops between now and June 2023.

Since April last year, GoodYarn Community has brought together nearly 300 locals from all walks of life to talk about mental health and arm themselves with more knowledge, strategies and skills to help care for themselves and others.

Te Hau Toka Chair Adell Cox said prevention and early intervention are key to empowering communities to stay well so "the more people who can access the programme, the better."

A particular focus will be on 'caring for the carers' with workshops offered to local social agencies, not-for-profit organisations and volunteers working with people who are under increased stress.

Small businesses will also be a priority, particularly those in regular contact with people who might be under pressure such as professional services, hairdressers, accountants, physios and allied health with under 50 staff.

The workshops will help people understand:

- > what mental health is and how to look after your mental health;
- > how to talk to someone if you are concerned about your/their mental health;
- > the signs and symptoms of mental stress and distress; and
- > where to go for support.

Head Light Trust Chief Executive Anna Dorsey said that the beefed-up training schedule will make it easier to share knowledge and tools to improve mental health and wellbeing across the community.

"It's giving more people the skills and confidence to raise awareness around mental health and be able to help themselves and those around them who are struggling. It's a great opportunity to help keep our community well and build resilience for the future."

Construction waste: let's skip the skip!

Construction and demolition waste, made up of a wide variety of materials including concrete, plasterboard, wood, metal, brick, glass and soil, accounts for around a third of all material sent to QLDC's Victoria Flats landfill.

Much of this material could be diverted from landfill through good practices before and during construction focused on reducing, reusing and recycling.

Enter the Better Building Group.

Part of Wao Charitable Trust – a community non-profit set up right here in our district to inspire and enable communities to move towards a regenerative, sustainable future – the group has been running workshops to show firms practical ways to reduce waste.

Monique Kelly from Wao said the workshops, which are supported by QLDC's Waste Minimisation Community Fund, have different topics aimed at different roles from tradies to architects.

"The first workshop looks at what the problem is, the second shows how to set up a waste minimisation plan, and the third highlights ways to reduce waste in the design process," she said.

"Joel Herbert, Trade Sales Manager at PlaceMakers and a founding member of the group, has spoken about how at one of the first meetings he learned about the waste generated by certain packaging which was not recyclable and went straight to landfill. Since then he's been working to find alternative packaging which PlaceMakers has managed to roll out nationwide."

"We believe collaboration is the key to success and that no one person or business can tackle this alone. For example, we've seen skip providers helping builders with waste separation as well as creating solutions for materials recycling."

Ms Kelly said the building industry, like many sectors, has been under a lot of pressure these last two years.

"Supply issues have caused major disruption but the silver lining might be that materials become more precious with less going into the skip."

And with the know-how shared at the Better Building workshops the future of construction waste in our district is looking greener.
