1.	Parks 2025 Update	
	Adrian Hodinott presented the item alongside Dave Winterburn. The purpose of this briefing is to provide the Community and Services Committee with an update on the progression of the new Parks maintenance contracts as requested at Full council in December 2024.	
	<ul> <li>Key points and questions asked:</li> <li>Staff noted still in procurement phase, will give periodic updates, noted procurement doesn't line up perfectly with governance timelines.</li> <li>Unpack 50% price attribute, 50% non-price. Intention is to send signal to market. 'Non-price' includes skills and methodology.</li> <li>Discussion on ability to recruit and keep good staff, noted by tenderer that this is an issue to be identified (due to staff housing etc.)</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>Discussion of significance in understanding 'non-price' variables.</li> <li>Discussion of ongoing performance criteria process. Model in place to monitor performance throughout term. Performance linked to contract i.e. whether it is successful.</li> </ul>	
	• Discussion on how this industry is evolving, including main pressures, how are contractors adapting to change in commercial	



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	<ul> <li>environment? Business model has evolved in commercial space, contractors have been asked to invest further into more specific needs for the community. Getting more sufficiently qualified and resourced contractors in the space. Ongoing pressure for resources in NZ for larger companies, local government tends to lose out with competition in contracting (for tier 1 employees)</li> <li>Discussion of how other regions compare when handling the same issues.</li> <li>Discussion of ratio of open spaces, to tracks and trails, to arbourculture in the district. What does this look like by spend? Open spaces easily largest portion, then arbour-culture, tracks and trails last (open spaces related to scope – sports fields to cemeteries, tracks and trails singular).</li> <li>Discussion of specialist services procurement. Clause in contracts for specialist services (contractor can subcontract, allows for agility).</li> <li>Discussion of interest in contracts. Queenstown and Wānaka can leverage commercial benefits for large/medium entities to be associated with our district.</li> <li>Portfolio of assets have seen escalation in costs. Issue being addressed through development of Long Term Plan and iterations of Annual Plans. Ongoing competition of resources within the organisation. The district has very high business requirements.</li> <li>Members queried whether going to open market for 3 contracts had a positive impact on the annual budget. Staff indicated they would need to report back to Council on this.</li> <li>Further discussion of contract and procurement timeframes.</li> </ul>	
2.	Draft Tree Succession Plan for Queenstown GardensBriana Pringle presented the item. Briana spoke to presentation alongsideDavid Winterburn, and arborists Lee Rowley and Stef White. The purpose ofthe item is to provide the Community and Services Committee with anoverview of the Draft Te Kararo Queenstown Gardens Tree Succession Planand seek input from Councillors on the plan.The draft succession plan will be shared with the Queenstown Gardensstakeholders and wider community for feedback, before being presented tothe Community and Services Committee for adoption in August 2025.Key discussion points and questions asked:

	Discussion of maintenance schedule framework.	
	• No current budget in Long Term Plan. If the plan is adopted in the	
	future, would look to fund through Long Term Plan.	
	• Plan presents an opportunity for the business community to get	
	involved, many businesses disillusioned by carbon offsetting, waiting	
	for local project to rally behind. A public-private collaboration on	
	this plan looks like a win.	
	• Discussion on soil quality. How much remediation needed? 120	
	years of firs eroding soil. In long term newly planted trees will	
	generate soil but in short term soil will have to be brought in.	
	<ul> <li>Is the concern around the Garden's itself and protecting inner</li> </ul>	
	garden or removing Douglas firs. Concern is heritage and experience	
	of garden's users and the protection the current trees provide.	
	• Discussion of access, felling and moving trees. How to mitigate loss	
	of green area. Key to have some network for access areas.	
	Consideration of multiuse and future proofing for access ways.	
	• Discussion on planting. Saplings, or use older trees? Right species in	
	right place for right purpose.	
	<ul> <li>Significance in engaging in storytelling early on i.e. doing better</li> </ul>	
	things in our region as opposed to planting pines for carbon	
	offsetting.	
	• Metrics and methodology. To be robust, that the project is that a big	
	financial commitment. When trees are removed, do they need ot be	
	replaced with new stock?	
	• What does this project tell us about wilding issues? E.g. Supports	
	wider wilding removal and the Queenstown Hill plan.	
	• Acknowledgment of stakeholders, especially frisbee golf. Targeted	
	convos with stakeholder including the tennis club to come,	
	engagement to follow workshop with committee.	
	<ul> <li>General Manager gave further updates on forest planting,</li> </ul>	
	investment to put back into gardens with planting. Good to get	
	further thinking and research over time back to committee.	
	• A summary of the project will be provided in the consultation	
	documentation.
