## REQUEST FOR OFFICIAL INFORMATION - RELEASE OF INFORMATION

We refer to your official information request dated 19 April 2022. You requested the following information from the Queenstown Lakes District Council (QLDC):

- 1. Does your council have a climate change strategy?
- Queenstown Lakes District Council's climate change strategy is provided in its current <u>Climate</u>
   <u>Action Plan 2019-2022</u> and has recently been updated in the <u>Draft Climate and Biodiversity</u>
   <u>Plan 2022-2025</u> which was released for consultation from 21 March until 25 April 2022.
- 2. Does your council have an implementation plan for your climate strategy?
- Refer to the current Climate Action Plan 2019-2022 (CAP) and chapter 13 of the Draft Climate and Biodiversity Plan 2022-2025 (CBP).
- 3. How do you measure outcomes relating to the achievement (or not) of the objectives of your climate change strategy?
- The five outcomes of the CAP are supported by a program of actions which are tracked and reported to the <u>Audit, Finance and Risk Committee</u> three times per year. Our overall progress to date is presented in chapter 10 of the draft CBP. A proposed indicators framework with measures to monitor progress towards the six outcomes of the draft CBP is presented in chapter 14.
- 4. Does your council have a biodiversity strategy?
- Council has recently integrated its biodiversity strategy into the Draft CBP.
- 5. Does your council have an implementation plan for your biodiversity strategy?
- Refer to chapter 13 of the draft CBP.

- 6. How do you measure outcomes relating to the achievement (or not) of the objectives of your biodiversity strategy?
- A proposed indicators framework with measures to monitor progress towards achieving the biodiversity outcome of the draft CBP is presented in chapter 14
- 7. Has your council mapped its Significant Natural Areas (SNAs)? Are these maps in your operative District Plan?
- SNAs have been mapped and are part of the Proposed District Plan (PDP). They are listed in Chapter 33 Indigenous Vegetation and Biodiversity.
   (https://www.qldc.govt.nz/media/puwdbtlq/pdp-chapter-33-indigenous-vegetation-biodiversity-feb-2022.pdf). The rules within Chapter 33 are now treated as operative. The SNAs are mapped in the District Plan Maps (ArcGIS Web Application).
- 8. How many SNAs have you identified in your district/region? Could you please quantify the total area these SNAs represent?
- There are 189 unique SNAs with a combined total area of approximately 32,815 Ha.
- 9. How does your council maintain SNAs?
- SNAs are maintained through the implementation of the policy set out in the district plan, through <a href="Chapter 33">Chapter 33</a>.
- 10. How many consents have you issued in the last five years to allow for vegetation clearance in SNAs? How many have been declined?
- There have been no consents granted or declined for vegetation clearance within an SNA in the last five years.
- 11. Do you have vegetation clearance rules that enable identification of additional SNAs through the consenting process?
- No. Any additional SNAs would need to be included through the Schedule 1 process (plan change) of the RMA.

## 12. How often does your council monitor SNAs?

A review of SNAs was undertaken in 2018 by appropriately qualified individuals to assist in identifying the most ecologically threatened and/or at risk SNAs across the district. Twelve specific SNAs were provided.

SNAs are monitored if a specific complaint is received in relation to a SNA. If Forest and Bird has concerns with specific SNAs we welcome this information, and our team will investigate accordingly.

We trust this response satisfactorily answers your request.
